Learning Bradford County History Over 500 Students Visit BCHS in First Half of 2008

Each year, the Bradford County Historical Society hosts several school and community group tours that give children the opportunity to learn about the past. During the first half of 2008, the society has hosted tours for over 500 children from age 4 to age 16.

Students from Troy, Canton, Northeast Bradford, Towanda and St. Agnes schools have visited this year. Additionally, groups from Bradford County Day Care and Serve, Inc. have toured the museum, to name a few.

What do these children have to say after their visit? Following are some letters received this year.

"My name is Codi. My two favorite parts are when we went into the old jail exercise room. My other favorite part is when we saw swords and old guns."

Thank you very much for volunteering for not just me, not just my school, the public for us to have a tour through the two story museum, aka, the old jail."

"My name is Dana. I loved everything. I especially liked the facts on the walls. I also liked the elk, Oscar. He was my favorite thing. I loved

everything truly."

"My name is Hannah. I loved the wedding dress. The dungeon was so cool. I loved being in there. I can't believe prisoners actually were in there. It was awesome. P.S. Thanks for the coal!"

Program about Canton's Harry Davenport to be Presented September 18th at BCHS

The September *Thursday Night at the Museum* programming will feature a presentation entitled, "Harry Davenport, Canton's Famous Actor."

The "Davenport Era" in Canton was a fascinating time for both the community and the county. The story begins with Harry's father, E.L. Davenport. The September

issue of *The Settler* magazine will feature a history of the life of E.L. Davenport, and program participants are encouraged to read this story to understand the background of this family prior to the presentation.

As an actor in such movies as *Gone With the Wind*, *Meet Me in St. Louis*, and *The Hunchback of Notre Dame*,

Harry Davenport was much loved by his hometown in Bradford County, and his friends across the United States. This program will feature information and over 100 photos that will highlight the life of Davenport, who was the oldest actor in the nation at the time of his death. Some footage of Davenport will also be included in the program.

Thursday Night at the Museum is a series of monthly programs that will continue until October. Each program begins at 6 p.m. in the BCHS Great Room, Pine Street, Towanda, PA.

Prior to each program, the museum is open beginning at 5:30 p.m. until 6 p.m. We hope that you will plan to attend these educational and entertaining programs, and while you're here, see everything the society has to offer.

The final program of the year is entitled "Voice from the Civil War - A Living History Presentation," scheduled for October 23rd.

Remembering a World War I Army Veteran

The Bradford County Historical Society was pleased to receive a collection of World War I items from the family of the late Herbert L. Campbell of Sayre.

Mr. Campbell was born in Athens Township on November 6, 1895 and resided in the Valley area his entire life. He was an Army combat veteran of World War I and served overseas with Company G, III Infantry of the 28th Division.

Known as the "Iron Division" because of its fierce combat abilities during World War I, the 28th is the oldest division in the armed forces of the United States.

Campbell entered the service on October 4, 1917. After training, the 28th Division arrived in France on May 18, 1918 and was committed to battle on July 14th.

Soldiers of this Division participated in six major campaigns: Champagne, Champagne-Marne, Aisne-Marne, Oise-Marne, Lorraine, and Meuse-Argonne. During those campaigns, over 14,000 battle casualties were suffered by the division.

Campbell was discharged on June 23, 1919 at Fort Dix, NJ. He passed away on April 21, 1974 and was buried with full military honors in the Tioga Point Cemetery.

On July 19, 2008, his family, including his wife, Letha Campbell Boughton, and children Doris Williams, William Campbell, and Geraldine Depew visited the museum in order to present two large framed photographs of the IIIth Infantry and a framed memorial that includes his dog tags, uniform buttons, and the last picture taken of him.

BCHS is honored to receive this memorial and appreciates the service of Herbert Campbell, a World War I Bradford County soldier.

A BUSY SUMMER

This summer has been busy at BCBS with a variety of projects being completed by staff and volunteers. Many of these projects include the reorganization of our archival material to allow staff to access it quickly and efficiently.

Our volunteers have been busy with projects such as organizing our collection of county postcards and creating a computer database of these for both inventory and research purposes.

Other parts of our collection continue to be placed into acid-free archival safe storage boxes and folders.

TROY NEWSPAPERS

A project was completed this summer that has allowed a series of Troy newspapers to be available for research on our computers. Three different publications are involved and include the New Star (1845-46), Northern Tier Gazette (1866-87), and the Troy Register (1885-99).

The Allen F. Pierce Foundation provided the funding to pay for this much needed project.

This fall is a great time to come out and see what is happening at BCBS! Visit our research library, our permanent and rotating museum exhibits, and our programs!


